Emergency Food and Clothing Trip to Lame Deer

The surrounding pictures are of our recent trip to Lame Deer to help provide some much needed supplies!









We are looking for donors or churches to help us buy a semi-load of firewood (\$1700 - \$1800), which will provide about 18 cords to help these families heat their homes. The load would be delivered to Four Winds, cut and split, and then delivered to the reservations during the fall of the year. Because of the weather conditions last winter, many of the Native people ran out of firewood and were unable to heat their homes. This is a pressing need!!!



FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Montanans were glad to see spring arrive. Our last snowfall (we hope!) of April 23rd, added to the record setting winter with 118 inches of snow. The old record of 104 inches was set in the winter of 1919-1920.

Both the Blackfeet and Northern Cheyenne Tribes suffered greatly from the bitter cold and snow. We were able to get trailer loads of food and winter clothing to the Cheyenne and Crow. Some of the roads on the Blackfeet Reservation were closed for almost 3 weeks, and it was impossible to travel there.

Please pray for our ministries that we somehow will be better able to help the Indian Nations more, especially in the winter months.
